What is OPSI?



- An inter-governmental organization
- ➤ Its Members are the utility regulators of 13 states and the District of Columbia
- Created in May 2005 as a non-profit corporation with its own Bylaws
- > OPSI's 14 Member Regulatory Agencies (Commissions) are:
- 1) Delaware Public Service Commission
- 2) District of Columbia Public Service Commission
- 3) Illinois Commerce Commission
- 4) Indiana Utility Regulatory Commission
- 5) Kentucky Public Service Commission
- 6) Maryland Public Service Commission
- 7) Michigan Public Service Commission

- 8) New Jersey Board of Public Utilities
- 9) North Carolina Utilities Commission
- 10) Public Utilities Commission of Ohio
- 11) Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission
- 12) Tennessee Regulatory Authority
- 13) Virginia State Corporation Commission
- 14) Public Service Commission of West Virginia

OPSI's Member Regulatory Agencies (Commissions)



- > All 14 Commissions are also members of NARUC
- > OPSI has affiliate status with NARUC
- ➤ OPSI is governed by its Board of Directors: Each Member Commission nominates one of its Commissioner to be on the OPSI Board
- > OPSI's Elected Officers:
 - President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer
 - Elected by the Board of Directors at Annual Meeting in October

Profile of OPSI's Member Commissions




- > All are multi-industry regulators
- > All regulate electricity and natural gas
- ➤ Most regulate water, wastewater/sewer, and telecom
- ➤ Half regulate transportation
- > OPSI's focus is on electricity (and related energy issues)
- > Five Commissions have three (3) Commissioners each
- ➤ One Commission has four (4) Commissioners
- > Seven Commissions have five (5) Commissioners each
- ➤ One Commission has seven (7) Commissioners

Why was OPSI created?




- ➤ In the United States, wholesale electricity market and transmission issues are in the jurisdiction of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC)
- ➤ Issues, activities, rates, and prices at the wholesale level correspondingly affect the distribution (or retail) level
- > State commissions have jurisdiction over distribution but not over the wholesale electricity market
- ➤ Therefore, OPSI was created to interact with the RTO of our region, which is PJM Interconnection LLC (PJM)

RTOs/ISOs in the North America



PJM Interconnection

- PJM is a FERC-approved RTO
- PJM's service territory covers all or parts of 13 states and DC (OPSI Members)
- > PJM *does not own* any transmission assets
- ▶ PJM operates high voltage grid by agreement among transmission owners
 (TOs) — see colored area



Profile of PJM



- ➤ Began as a power pool in 1927; FERC-approved RTO in 1997
- Operates is a non-stock company
- > Population in PJM's service area: about 58 million
- > Transmission lines: 61 000 miles (98170 km)
- Generating capacity: 180 400 MW
- > Generating sources: 1 365 with diverse fuel types
- Peak demand: 158 448 MW
- > Annual energy delivery: just over 682 000 million MWh
- > PJM Members (e.g., energy companies): over 700
- > PJM, acting neutrally and independently, operates the largest wholesale electricity market in the world

Relationship between OPSI and PJM



- > OPSI's primary purpose is to act as a liaison group to:
 - PJM Interconnection, LLC (PJM)
 - PJM's Board of Managers
 - Independent Market Monitor for PJM
 - FERC and other agencies
- ➤ OPSI and its Member Commissions *are not members* of PJM
- > OPSI's Board of Directors and PJM's Board of Managers have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to allow interaction among commissioners and their staff, PJM and its employees, and industry stakeholders

Regular Activities of OPSI



- ➤ Monthly Board meeting (including 5 in-person meetings)
- ➤ 14 Board members vote but other interested commissioners and staff members participate in discussions and give input
- > Participation in various PJM committees and workgroups (with non-voting status)
- ➤ Regular teleconferences between OPSI, PJM's technical staff, and the Independent Market Monitor for PJM
- > OPSI identifies relevant issues to discuss and PJM makes available technical staff for response
- ➤ OPSI has a Standing Staff Committee and also organizes workgroups based on current issues
