Session III: Key Issues & Approaches for Effective Monitoring

This session will examine the current approaches and issues in electricity market monitoring including but not limited to:

- 1. Transparency and timeliness of availability of market data. Commercial confidentiality issues/laws. Who should have access to financial contracting information?
- 2. Who performs the monitoring function (regulator, TSO, market monitor and/or others)? Capacity of regulators and others to carry out monitoring function. Interaction between market monitoring process and regulatory process.
- 3. Ensuring compliance with market rules. What to do about behavior harmful to system reliability and market efficiency?
- 4. Measuring the performance of the system and market operators. What should be the benchmark to measure the system and market operator performance?
- 5. Governance of the TSO/ISO/MO/SO organizations.
