Electricity Industry

- Evolution
 - Competitive retail/generation
 - Distributed generation / transmission bypass
 - Net metering / local distribution systems
 - Disconnecting from the system
 - System of the future
 - Aggregators as competitors
- Regulatory response
 - Protect monopoly to protect companies and consumers?
 - Allow competition but continue regulating?
 - Experience in transportation
 - Anti-trust issues and regulatory bargain

Engagement

Timing

- Is the industry ready for a discussion about the future of regulation?
- Is government ready? (still assume monopoly)
- Are public interest groups ready?
- Who leads the discussions? Government or private interests? e.g., manufacturers, research institutes, academia?
- Industry in Canada asking for private discussions
 - 2008/9 carbon dialogue in Canada
 - Blank slate approach to looking at the future

Social media

- How to use to monitor and address issues as they arise
- As deregulation begins, monitor to address misconceptions and monitor hot spots in industry performance
- Complaints resolution process
 - CCTS in Canada communicates through social media presence
