NARUC Statement on FERC Order 1920-A

WASHINGTON (November 25, 2024) — On November 21, 2024, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission issued an order on rehearing and clarification for Order 1920, *Building for the Future Through Electric Regional Transmission Planning and Cost Allocation*.

As the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners continues to digest the specifics of the order, we appreciate that it appears several of the substantive matters raised by NARUC in its Order 1920 rehearing request have been addressed in Order 1920-A, especially as outlined in the separate statement's [appendix](#). We view these as positive changes and want to recognize the work of the chairman, commissioners and staff in adopting these revisions. Order 1920-A and its impacts will now play out over significant proceedings and compliance filings. Given the states' pivotal role in protecting consumers, we will continue to support the ability of states to have an appropriate and needed role in transmission planning and cost allocation.

“As the entities empowered with oversight of the sale of electricity to retail customers and primacy in transmission permitting, states play a critical role in ensuring that infrastructure investments benefit end-use consumers,” said NARUC President Tricia Pridemore, of the Georgia Public Service Commission. “We look forward to continuing the dialogue with our federal colleagues through opportunities such as the ongoing FERC-NARUC [Federal-State Current Issues Collaborative](#).”
